

A little girl went to visit Father Christmas in the local garden centre grotto. He welcomed her with a smile and the question of what she would like for Christmas.



Fr Paul's Letter

Dear Friends,

'O Little Town of Bethlehem'

As Christmas approaches we hear once again of references to that 'little town' which was the setting for the first Christmas. We sing about this place in many seasonal songs and carols and recall the simple scene in that stable in that place where there was no room at the Inn!

Today that area of the world is in the midst of enormous turmoil and is the setting of a terrible ongoing conflict in which many lives have been lost and many people have been displaced from their homes. This is a far cry from the hopes and aspirations of the Christmas season and the message of the holy child of Bethlehem.

Yet we recall that at the time of Jesus' birth, the political climate at the time was far from stable and peaceful. The land was occupied by foreign forces and the whims of despotic rulers prevailed. The Christmas story involves the struggles of a poor family who are forced to flee from their homeland. It tells of the slaughter of innocent young children at the hands of a ruthless king whose desire to hold onto power was his motivation for much of what he did.

In so many ways the world hasn't changed, despite the great advances that human beings have made since that time. The motivations of the human heart are much the same as they always have been. Jesus warns his hearers that it is what emanates from within the human heart that are the root causes of our problems! He came to show us that there is a different and better way to live alongside each other. This entails the need to ensure that the desires of the heart are kept in check by surrendering ourselves to a higher authority. Jesus came to reveal what this 'authority' looks like as manifested in a human being.

At the heart of the Christmas story there is a small new-born child who comes to bless the world with His presence. So many of the true blessings of this season are in those small things that are offered and received in a spirit of love and gratitude.



Carol singing is not what it used to be. My fond memories of a group of choristers, muffled in scarves and overcoats, carrying lanterns, and walking from door to door in the snow, as they sang 'While shepherds watched ...' had to be suddenly revised when I saw your own music group, in T-shirts inscribed with 'Jesus loves You', singing 'Little donkey', in your shopping centre. I suspect any money you raised would just about have paid for the electricity used to power your banks of electronic equipment. Singing in the main square of the Centre next to the fountain may have looked good, but it seemed to mean that the choirmen were obliged to make constant trips to the lavatory.

Here at St James the Least of All, carol singing is regarded as a staff perk for the choir; the year when the Boys' Brigade tried to break their monopoly was suppressed with a ruthlessness that would have impressed Genghis Kahn.

Our annual carol-singing route involves months of meticulous planning. We find that a transparent collection box is vital, so that donors can see what earlier patrons have given. This means that those who are bound to put in notes must be visited first – 'pour encourager les autres'. It also needs a detachable base, so that if coppers are given, they can be removed from sight before the next call.

Those homes that contain several children are visited just after bedtime, so that parents will give generously simply to get the choir to go somewhere else. Veiled threats to stay and sing more carols (unless they give generously) are usually very effective. Getting whoever looks the most innocent and photogenic to ring the bell and ask for money is a far more subtle way of ensuring a donation than planting any number of mafia lookalikes (such as our church treasurer) on the doorstep.

The choir always finishes its evening at the local pub – but again, the timing must be carefully managed. Too early and there will only be the landlord, his wife, and their Labrador to listen; too late and people will be so full of Christmas cheer that any carols will be hi-jacked and become the equivalent of back-of-the bus rugby songs.

However, sheds are mainly about making social connections. They are about friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge and of course a lot of laughter.

News from Pulborough Parish Council

Budget 24/25

After a lot of discussion at both the Finance and Policy Committee and Full Council we have agreed (provided no additional information comes forward) our budget for 24/25. We have made a number of changes that will allow us to improve how the council operates and bring benefits to the community. We have manged to keep the increase in the precept to 10p per week (Band D property). More details on this will be available shortly.

Transport Working Group

At the recent meeting of the Transport Working Group the priorities were updated and agreed. Unfortunately, invited representatives from West Sussex County Council Highways were unable to attend. Seeking a crossing outside St Mary's School remains a top priority for the Parish Council.

Recreation Ground

The Parish Clerk and I visited a Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) in Lewes, recently. We wanted to better understand the surface being proposed as a cost-effective solution for our MUGA. We have produced a business plan to support opportunities for funding and plan meetings with the Sussex FA (and other interested parties) to discuss further.

The Sussex Wildlife Trust event on 10th November was attended by over 100 people. There has been considerable positive feedback following our presentation and we are seeking to work more closely with the Trust, to progress our rewilding/environment objectives. Since the event we have visited Nutbourne Common, with local councillors and residents, to consider what could be done to improve it environmentally. We are arranging a visit on site by the Horsham Rewilding Initiative to advise on what could be done and working closely with the Nutbourne Residents Association on any Proposals.

Community Pantry

Thanks to the Neighbourhood Wardens, Councillor Kevin Lee and Maria his wife, things are moving forward quickly with the Community Pantry. It is to be based in the Parish Office at the rear of the Sports and Social Club. Over the next few weeks, the office is being refurbished, including new windows. Further information will be available on its launch on the Parish Council Digital Presence.

We agreed soon after the election that we should improve our social media presence. We are pleased to see that the engagement rate on our Facebook post averages a reach of 13,000 people. This is a substantial increase and very encouraging.

News from Pulborough Medical Group

Winter season is upon us again and thanks to those who were eligible for keeping up to date with covid and flu vaccines. Covid now joins a number of winter illnesses so important to look after ourselves and loved ones and keep ourselves healthy.

For some common winter illnesses and associated symptoms there are excellent online resources to guide you with symptom management and when to contact. Also our invaluable resource in local pharmacies who are well placed to guide with a number of over the counter treatments available and who we work closely with. 111 are also a useful resource if unsure of whether a symptom may be serious or not.

For general health and wellbeing advice regarding diet, exercise etc we have health and wellbeing advisor appointments. We also have our excellent social prescriber available to help with a number of issues from social isolation to guiding people with some issues regarding housing or return to work. Drop in citizens advice bureau service is available certains days.

MIND also are linked in with our local surgeries to provide mental health support which is so key this time of year to look after our mental wellbeing. We are also fortunate to have time to talk services run through West sussex providing talking therapies. Christmas time can be a very hard time for a number of people so do remember to check in with loved ones /colleagues or if you yourself are struggling do remember your local GP service and helplines available – Samaritans and West sussex mental healthline. To gain access to these services our care navigators can signpost and we have a new phone service to help ease the wait times on phones and e consult service available as well.

Some common winter ailments

Sore throat:

Sore throats are very common and usually nothing to worry about. They normally get better by themselves within a week.

To help soothe a sore throat and shorten how long it lasts, you can:

- gargle with warm, salty water (children should not try this)
- drink plenty of water
- eat cool or soft foods
- avoid smoking or smoky places

- suck ice cubes, ice lollies or hard sweets but do not give young children anything small and hard to suck because of the risk of choking
- rest

You can ask a pharmacist about ways of relieving the pain and discomfort of a sore throat, such as:

- paracetamol or ibuprofen
- medicated lozenges containing a local anaesthetic, antiseptic, or antiinflammatory medicine
- anaesthetic spray (although there's little proof they help)

You can buy these treatments from a supermarket or from a pharmacist without a prescription.

You do not normally need antibiotics for a sore throat because they will not usually relieve your symptoms or speed up your recovery. They'll only be prescribed if a GP thinks you could have a bacterial infection.

See your GP if

- your sore throat does not improve after a week
- you often get sore throats
- if immune suppressed
- shivering/high temperature
- or if have general concerns

A severe or long-lasting sore throat could be something like strep throat (a bacterial throat infection)

Cough:

-Rest, fluids and some evidence for honey and lemon and pharmacy teams can advise over the counter products

When to see a GP

- you've had a cough for more than 3 weeks (persistent cough)
- your cough is very bad or quickly gets worse for example, you have a hacking cough or cannot stop coughing
- you feel very unwell
- you have chest pain
- you're losing weight for no reason
- the side of your neck feels swollen and painful (swollen glands)
- you find it hard to breathe
- you have a weakened immune system for example, because of chemotherapy or diabetes (Continued overleaf....)

See a GP urgently if you're coughing up blood.

We hope that you remains well during this period but our team and local pharmacies along with online NHS resources and 111 are here if you need us.

And with on behalf of PMG team and our extended local health service providers we would like to wish you a happy and healthy Christmas and New Year and thank you for all your support to our team.



December in the Garden by The Auld Sage

Winter has arrived with the first few frosts, which have finished off the lingering leaves on the deciduous trees and finally did in the dahlias which were continuing to flower out of season.

So, now that most of the herbaceous plants have died back it's time to remove the decaying stems and leaves leaving any that may have an architectural interest (like the grasses with their lovely seedheads). If your clumps of herbaceous plants are spreading out of control, dig around the outside of the clump and reduce the size of them with your spade. The unending chasing of leaves has been continuing but will shortly come to an end, so gather up the natural manure provided by nature to enrich your soil after they have been composted down.

Now that the deciduous plants have been stripped of their leaves the colourful barks of dogwood, silver birch and acers have come to the fore with their stunning hues. And likewise, the evergreen shrubs that have been overshadowed and dulled into the background of your garden display are now shining through.

Don't neglect your pond which may have become a trap for leaves during the leaf deluge as the leaves break down in the water, they can turn the water quite toxic. So, give the pond a good clean out and reduce any of the marginal plants which are too large or encroaching on the surface area of your pond.

As the heating has been turned on/up in your house the water is being sucked out of the compost in which your house plants are residing so don't forget to water them regularly.

So, happy gardening and season's greetings!

P.S. Don't relax too much over the winter. Keep the garden patrolled to keep an eye on what needs to be done and to contemplate on what you require from your garden in the year to come.

The first-ever nativity scene

This Christmas, thousands of Nativity plays will be held around the UK. Ever wonder who staged the very first one?

It was St Francis of Assisi, and it was 800 years ago, in Greccio, Italy, on 25th December 1223.

Francis had been born into a wealthy family, but abandoned his noble inheritance when he became a Christian. Instead, he had turned to a life of great simplicity, in service to Christ's church.

Francis spent many hours meditating on the stories of the life of Christ, and even travelled to the Holy Land in 1219 and 1220, to see the various holy sites of Jesus's life. The sites deeply moved him, as they brought the Bible stories to vibrant life.

Back in Italy, in November of 1223, Francis was in Rome, and he had an idea. Why not share something of the inspiration of the Holy Land with his people here in Italy?

Barely 50 miles to the north, in Greccio, he knew many people to whom he had been ministering for years. He could at least show them something of the simplicity of the birth of Jesus. And so it was that, two weeks before Christmas, Francis asked his friend, the Lord of Greccio, Giovanni Velita, to prepare a nearby cave with live animals and a hay-filled manger.

That cave, beside some rocky crags, became the venue of the very first ever Nativity scene. On Christmas 1223, when the people of Greccio attended Christmas Mass as usual, they were invited to 'come and see' the simple scene.

According to his biographer, Brother Thomas of Celano, Francis wanted people to see what Jesus had "suffered for lack of the necessities of a newborn babe, and how He lay in the manger between the ox and ass."

According to eyewitness accounts of the moment, fires lit the dark scene while crowds arrived at the spot carrying candles and torches. There were also accounts of miracles happening that night. Some people had a vision of a real infant in the empty manger, and others reported miraculous healings.

All in all, the Nativity scene was an instant success, and soon other communities were staging their own.

Today, you can still visit the cave and rocks where the first Nativity was staged. It is now a Franciscan hermitage and sanctuary. Every year at Christmas, the people of Greccio stage a live, historical re-enactment of St Francis and the first Nativity scene. Pope Francis has visited the spot two times:

Where did Christmas cards come from?

Christmas cards have a history which may surprise you: their origins are not of the Church, but of the Post Office and railways.

Of course, very early 'Christmas cards' had been around for hundreds of years, in the form of a simple exchange of Christmas greetings in private letters. The earliest such letter on record was written in England in 1534. In 1611 a HUGE Christmas card made a one-off appearance. It measured a whopping 33" by 24", and was given to King James I of England (who was also King James VI of Scotland). It featured an illustration of a rose, four poems, a song, and a Christmas message for the king and his son.

Then in 1843 came the creation of Christmas cards as we know them today. One enterprising man was responsible for this: Sir Henry Cole, a senior civil servant who had helped launch the 'Public Record Office', now called the Post Office.

Sir Henry Cole helped to introduce the Penny Post, as it was called. Until then, only rich people could afford the Post, but with the building of the railways, which carried far more packages than a horse and cart (and went much faster), suddenly the Penny Post became possible.

Sir Henry wanted to encourage 'ordinary' people to use the new service. So he came up with the bright idea of a creating a simple card that people could send each other for Christmas. His friend, John Horsley, was an artist, who designed a three-panel card. Two panels depicted people caring for the poor, and the middle panel showed a family enjoying a large Christmas dinner.

They printed about 1000 cards that first year, and advertised under the slogan: 'Just published, a Christmas Congratulations Card; or picture emblematical of old English festivity to perpetuate kind recollections between dear friends!'

The cards sold for one shilling each and could be posted to friends and family for a Penny. There was an immediate, warm response from the public.

Printing methods improved, and by 1860 Christmas cards were produced in large quantities. By 1870 the cost of posting one had dropped to half a penny, and the custom was rapidly gaining popularity. By the early 1900s, the custom had spread across Europe.

The first cards usually included a Nativity scene, and in late Victorian times, robins and snow-scenes. Robins were chosen because the postmen in those days were nick-named 'Robin Postmen', because of their red uniforms.

Christmas cards appeared in the USA in the late 1840s. They were mass produced from 1875, and in 1915 John C Hall and two of his brothers created Hallmark Cards, which today offers 2,000 different designs of Christmas card.

Charity Christmas cards began in Denmark in the early 1900s. They spread to Sweden and Norway, and then on throughout Europe and America. Last year the Royal Mail estimated that it had delivered 150 million cards during the Christmas period.

Stop mist on your windscreen

If you will be out in your car a lot this Christmas, here's an easy way to stop your windscreen from misting up:

Simply clean it with shaving foam. It provides a protective barrier which stops mist forming. Ice hockey players use it to stop their face masks from steaming up while they're on the ice.

It's easy to do. Put a good dollop of shaving foam onto a clean towel, and then wipe it all over the windscreen. Then take a second clean towel, and gently wipe off the shaving foam. This leaves a protective barrier, but it will need to be regularly reapplied, to continue to work.

Drink tea or coffee each day - and keep old age weakness away!

Recent research has found that drinking coffee or tea in midlife may help keep you stronger in later life.

A study at the National University of Singapore concluded that higher caffeine intake is associated with lower odds of physical frailty in old age, regardless of the source of the caffeine.

Physical frailty in old age was defined as having at least two of the following: weight loss, exhaustion, slowness and weakness. The scientists also measured handgrip strength and the time taken to complete a timed up-andgo (TUG) test.

In addition to caffeine, coffee and tea contain rich bioactive polyphenols, which have antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. These have been associated with reduced risk for diseases that increase frailty, such as diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, obesity and neurodegenerative disease.
