

1st Reading: Genesis Ch 3 vv 8-14 Read by Sam Copus – Headteacher of St Mary's School

In the early chapters of the Bible we hear stories which try to encapsulate important truths about God and His relationship with his creation. The original perfect harmony and integration of all elements of creation is ruptured by the desire of human beings to assert their own will over the will of God.

The choice to eat the forbidden fruit spirals into a general state of disharmony and disintegration which undermines the Lord's loving purposes for all his children.

5th Reading: Luke Ch 1 vv 26-38 Read by Dr Tim Fooks – High Sheriff of West Sussex

Many years later God's messenger is sent to a young women who proves to be faithful, humble and obedient. She will be given a mighty task and a most unique calling to be the mother of the one in whom God will bring about the salvation of humanity.

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you.' But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be.

The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. 6th Reading: Luke Ch 2 vv1-7

Read by Julian Edge – Co chair of Governors of St Mary's School

St Matthew's account of the birth of Jesus focuses on the place of Joseph, as the ancestor of King David and how Jesus' birth is foretold by the prophets of old. However this child is no less than 'God-with-us'- Emmanuel!

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and

wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

Seventh Reading: Luke Ch 2 vv 8-16
Read by Elaine Waight – Director of Services for
Family Support Work -FSW

In St Luke's account of Jesus' birth, the familiar characters appear and the familiar story unfolds. The first people to be given the privilege of seeing the new born infant are local people who live and work on the margins of their society. This is a foretaste of who Jesus will have a particular concern for in his future ministry. In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.'

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger.

8th Reading: Matthew Ch 2 vv1-11

Read by John Dixon – Chair of Pulborough & District Community

Care Association

St Matthew tells of those who come from foreign parts, who are not from among the Lord's people. They represent all the peoples of the earth from all cultures and from all over the globe. Their gifts shed much light on the identity of Jesus and His universal significance. In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

9th Reading: John Ch 1 vv 1-14 Read by the Rector

St John tries to put into words truths that might astound and mystify us. He speaks of Jesus as existing from the beginning as the Divine Word. Yet in time this Word has taken on human flesh to live alongside us and in whom God speaks most clearly and powerfully.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.
